Please be sure to express your thanks to these 2017 high-level supporters, as well as all sponsoring companies.



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
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

superintendent position at Idaho Falls Country Club, where Randy Ernst was superintendent. Randy hired me the spring of continued page 6



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

2017 Delegates from the Northwest Region

Chapter Delegate Meeting 2017

The creation of a political action committee and proposed bylaw changes were key topics of the 2017 Chapter Delegates Meeting. The 88 delegates from 94 chapters also heard from nominees for the 2018 GCSAA Board of Directors and an update on the Disaster Relief Fund. The two-day meeting was held Nov. 7-8 in Kansas City, Mo., and at GCSAA headquarters in Lawrence, Kansas.

The event opened with welcomes from GCSAA President Bill H. Maynard, CGCS, and GCSAA CEO Rhett Evans. Evans shared that the Disaster Relief Fund has raised \$150,000 to date, and gave an update on the association's solid financial footing. Other presentations on key initiatives included:

• State BMP Implementation: GCSAA continues going forward with the goal to have all 50 states with a BMP in place by 2020. Ten states have a BMP in place, with three more set to come online this winter. The state BMP initiative continues to be successful, and the 50 by 2020 goal is expected to be reached. If you would like to help, contact Kevin Hicks or myself.

• Government affairs: GCSAA now has a political action committee (GCSAAPAC) to support advocacy efforts on behalf of the membership. GCSAAPAC will distribute money to lawmakers who help advance GCSAA's Priority Issues Agenda. National Golf Day 2018 is set for April 24-25. The Grassroots Ambassador Program now has 305 ambassadors paired with members of Congress, but spots are still available.


• Election and Governance: The delegates learned about proposed bylaws changes that would alter the current election process and proposed changes to the GCSAA Bylaws, and updates made to the GCSAA Code of Ethics and Professional Conduct Guidelines. The proposed bylaw changes are based on feedback from past delegates to make the election process clearer and to put the control back in the hands of the members/delegates.

The business portion of the delegates meeting concluded with presentations from, and breakout sessions with, the candidates for the 2018 board. The election will take place on Feb. 8 at the GCSAA Annual Meeting in San Antonio.

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2017 Northwest GCSA Turfgrass Expo

After three years of planning, assembling the right list of speakers, and coordinating a major event between three chapters, the Northwest Expo finally came to fruition in October, and, by all accounts, was a huge success. Final numbers aren't

Dr. Thom Nikolai discussed some new (and old) cultural and mechanical practices that work and don't work for

During the education sessions, we heard the latest from some of the industry's top researchers and experts.

Dr. Brian Horgan's first talk was a potpourri of research topics including winter recovery, bentgrass germination data (for when you don't get winter recovery), ice abatement from putting surfaces, and the impact of wetting agents on spring green up and surface hardness. Each of these could have been a one-hour talk so he moved at a pretty rapid pace, still providing great information. He also gave a "big picture" talk on the value of turf and golf as a sustainable turfgrass system

modern management programs. He also discussed counterintuitive research results related to rolling and pest control that sparked many questions from the group. As usual, Thom's delivery and content

were right on the mark while keeping the audience entertained and engaged.





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Hiring from Within

Hiring today is very different than it was just six years ago. At that time, when I put an ad out for

staffing, I would end up with a file folder stuffed full of apps. So many would come in that I would have the luxury to pick and choose through the massive selection to find that one or two to interview and hire.

Fast forward to now. When ads go out for hiring, I am lucky to get one or two applications returned to me. Over the years, as the application inquiries have dwindled, we have had to resort to "Plan B." For us, that means training the core staff that we have and growing them. Our city is expanding leaps and bounds each year, which leads to an increasing need for parks, golf, streets, facilities and fleet staff. What do we do when we are growing and can't find people?

The city was fortunate to find a handful of young staff a couple of years back, who started out as maintenance seasonals. During their time here we have seen the potential in them and

invested time and training so that they may grow and be better equipped as leaders among the crews. So far, we have had good luck with this system. We have discovered some great qualities in them, which we have been able to build upon. As they have grown in their few short years, they have been able to move into positions of higher responsibility, allowing us to train and mold them the way



that suits our crews best. There is certainly a cost associated with training - but it is priceless when you have people who grow through the positions and learn the work environment and culture firsthand. In the end, this has been a better fit for our staffing and we have found success through this process.

On a lighter staffing note, a very crucial and important part of our maintenance crew is the four-legged kind. We have a pup





named Callie (Calloway) who helps with the goose problem in the winter, and chases marmots and mice in the summer season. In between her routes she supervises the shop mechanic and has lunch duty with the parks staff. Her responsibilities include therapist, guard dog, rodent control, public relations and more.

The second four-legged team we have on staff are of the hoof kind. Seven goats make up the weed maintenance department and are on duty from April through September. They make their rounds from the golf course to the parks, chomping their way through a delicious feast of knapweed, dalmation toadflax, and



skeleton-weed. During the process of weed control functions, they also serve as a petting zoo for the local families who often stop by to see them in action. They have become well known celebrities as they frequently grace the city's Facebook pages. These fourlegged critters are a lot of work, but they are part of what makes our jobs a little more fun.
